mail - send mail to designated users

SYNOPSIS

mail [-yn] [person ...]
mail -f file

DESCRIPTION

Mail with no argument searches for a file called *.mail*, prints it in reverse chronological order if it is nonempty, then asks if it should be saved. If the answer is *y*, the mail is added to *mbox*. Finally *.mail* is truncated to zero length. To leave the mailbox untouched, hit 'delete.' The question can be answered on the command line with the argument '-y' or '-n'.

When *persons* are named, *mail* takes the standard input up to an end of file and adds it to each *person's* *.mail* file. The message is preceded by the sender's name and a postmark. A *person* is a user name recognized by *login* (I). Mail is sent to the default working directory of that user.

When a user logs in he is informed of the presence of mail. No mail will be received from a sender to whom *.mail* is inaccessible or unwritable.

The -f option causes the named file to be printed as if it were mail.
